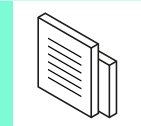


# Guide for the general municipal election

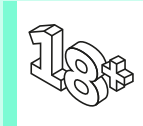

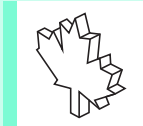
## TO VOTE, YOU MUST MEET THE FOLLOWING CONDITIONS ON ELECTION DAY:



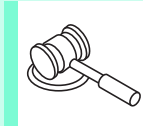
Be entered on  
the list of  
electors



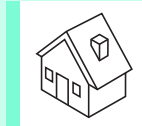
Be 18 years of  
age or older



Be a Canadian  
citizen

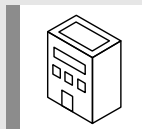


Not have lost

Be domiciled in the municipality  
and be living in Québec since

**OR**



Own a building or occupy  
a business establishment

at least 45 days

### YOUR DOMICILE IS NOT LOCATED IN THE MUNICIPALITY?

You can exercise your right to vote if you are, for example:

- The owner of an apartment building
- The owner of a cottage or second residence
- The lessee of a business establishment

To have your name added to the list of electors, you must send a written request to the municipality before the end of the board of revisors' work. Building co-owners and co-occupants of business establishments must designate who, among them, will be entered on the list of electors by means of a power of attorney.

## ARE YOU ENTERED ON THE LIST OF ELECTORS?

You can check it:

- Online, on the Élections Québec website
- By consulting the notice of entry that you will receive by mail at the beginning of the election period
- By contacting your returning officer

ON ELECTION DAY,  
YOU WILL NOT BE ABLE TO BE ENTERED ON  
THE LIST NOR CHANGE YOUR ADDRESS.

## TO ENTER OR MODIFY YOUR ENTRY

Report to the revision office on the days and times indicated on the notice of entry sent by the municipality in the mail. A relative, your spouse or a person living with you can complete this process on your behalf. Some municipalities accept remote applications.

### REQUIRED DOCUMENTS

To enter the list or to change your address, bring one or two supporting documents which, together, show your name, date of birth and address. For example, you can bring:

- A driver's licence
- A health insurance card and a phone bill
- A birth certificate and a Hydro bill

# TO VOTE

You must establish your identity by presenting one of the following documents:

- Québec health insurance card
- Québec driver’s licence
- Canadian passport
- Certificate of Indian Status
- Canadian Forces identification card

## NEED HELP?

Most polling locations are accessible. The election officers at your polling station are there to help you. You can request the accessibility kit, which contains several tools. You can also bring someone with you — an interpreter, for example.

## POLITICAL FINANCING

**In municipalities with 5,000 inhabitants or less**, there is no public funding. In a general election or by-election, however, you can donate up to \$200 to each candidate.

**In municipalities with 5,000 inhabitants or more**, your vote can have a direct effect on the financing of political parties and independent candidates. Even if the candidate of your choice is not elected, they may be reimbursed 70% of their election expenses if they obtain at least 15% of the votes. By voting for the person who most closely matches your values and vision, you’re helping them to continue their activities. During a general election or by-election, you can also make up to \$200 in contributions to a political party or an authorized independent candidate.
