# Heritage Lower St. Lawrence Appoints Guy Caron as Interim Executive Director

Heritage Lower St. Lawrence is pleased to announce the appointment of former federal MP Guy Caron to the position of Acting Executive Director of the organization for a period of four to six months.

Mr. Caron will be responsible for carrying out a restructuring that has become necessary due to the rapid growth of the organization, which now has a staff of 10 employees.

The Chairman of the Board of Directors of Heritage Lower St. Lawrence, Mr. Alexander Reford, is delighted with Mr. Caron's arrival. "Guy's vast experience, his knowledge of the region, his sensitivity to the issues of linguistic minority communities and his achievements as a member of the House of Commons make him the ideal person to lead Heritage Lower St. Lawrence," said Mr. Reford.

"Heritage has been forced by the pandemic to rethink the delivery of its services, but Guy will now lead our dedicated staff in its efforts to reorganize the organization so that it can meet the challenges of the future".

Born and raised in Rimouski, Guy Caron was the NDP Member of Parliament for the riding of Rimouski-Neigette-Témiscouata-Les Basques from 2011 to 2019. He also served as the NDP Parliamentary Leader from October 2017 to February 2019.

"I am very happy to join Heritage Lower St. Lawrence. I have had many contacts with the organization during my parliamentary career and I have always been impressed with its dynamism, its professionalism and the way it represents its community in the region," explains Mr. Caron, who has worked in the past with organizations representing the Canadian Francophonie in a minority setting, particularly in universities.

Participants of all ages are needed! Please help us to spread the word.



#### Kahlil Gibran, The Prophet (poetry)

Recommended by Catherine Beauchemin

Al-Mustafa, after having lived for many years in the city of Orphales, is about to board a ship to return to his native island. He is approached by a group of people with whom he discusses subjects such as daily life and the human condition.

Long before I knew that Kahlil Gibran was a writer, I fell in love with his paintings and drawings. It was only later that I realized that he was also one of the most widely read poets in the world. Published in 1923, *The Prophet* is his best-known work. Whether in times of celebration or sorrow, his words are still relevant almost 100 years later.

#### **War and Peace**

Though there's hard work for many, especially in the summer months, and there can be dangerous weather to contend with year-round here in the Lower Saint Lawrence, most of us associate Metis with a sense of peace. The separations of recent months have given many of us a little taste of what our parents and grandparents went through in times of war. And it is particularly important to remember this in 2020 – 75 years after the end of the World War II, which brought death and destruction even to our shores. Starting in 1942, German submarines (U-boats, anglicized version of 'unterseeboot') repeatedly entered the St. Lawrence, sinking 23 ships at the cost of hundreds of lives. Then Metis lighthouse-keeper Octave Gendron, after reporting seeing a German U-boat, acted quickly when the U-69 sunk the SS Carolus off Pointe-aux-Senelles. Metisians and Les Boulois were shocked by the sights and explosive sounds of maritime warfare from the river, and by the bodies and debris that washed up on the beach. People gathered daily at the then Macnider/Beach Road post office, anxious for messages from loved ones fighting in Europe or other theatres of

war, and sending them letters of hope to remind them of home. Such a letter has just come to light - a poem from a mother to the son she misses at sea (and in the Saint Lawrence). Visit heritagelsl.ca/return-to-metis.

Raised in the Lower Saint Lawrence, Me Chabot offers bilingual legal services in the region and beyond, with an emphasis on litigation. She received a Bachelor of Laws and Bachelor of Civil Law from McGill University and is currently a member of both the Bar of Quebec and the Law Society of Ontario.

As our societies become increasingly globalized, so may our personal lives acquire an increasingly cross-border dimension. Wills and estates are two of the areas in which this phenomenon may be felt most strongly. Yet, different states' rules governing these matters may differ.

How may one determine the rules applicable to their given situation? In case of conflict, in which jurisdiction and tribunal must one seek resolution or redress? 

# Learning Outdoors with my Primary Pirates, Destination: Discovery!






Somewhat apprehensive about returning to school after weeks of self-isolation, I can now confirm the positive outcomes thanks to outdoor learning. I witnessed students 'connected', despite no technological device in sight, no wifi, no screen, OK, only sun screen! They were connected to nature! Nature is magical and nature is free. I can testify their thirst for learning, children being children, at one with the world around them in the Great Outdoors.



Attending Metis Beach School, in Métis-sur-Mer with the jestic Saint-Lawrence as our immediate neighbour is a ticket to a world of exploration in itself. Making the most of the beauty on our doorstep, we went on low-tide rockpool adventures, skimming the seabed for lobsters, sea cucumbers, starfish and snail eggs. Having analyzed the numbers on Tide Charts, we were well-prepared, knowing to expect either high tide or low tide. Some became experts at finding bright coloured polished seaglass, others were on the look out for seashells. What fun they had analyzing their treasures using oversized magnifying glasses! I can proudly say that my environmentally friendly kiddies took the time to help clean-up the beach, as part of a larger municipal clean-up. Whilst on our end of year school trip to the Mitis-Point Lighthouse, we planted beach grasses as a natural barrier to help prevent shoreline erosion.




Eyes up to the sky, we played Cloud Bingo! Have you ever tried to find a cloud that resembles a turtle or a dolphin? With eyes closed, we aimed to put the bird name to the type of chirp we heard. Birds, we were able to observe from a distance and tally if they were in flight, in a tree or on the ground. We used scooters to explore our community. house numbers were noted, and we broke them down into Place Value Columns of hundreds, tens and units, whilst another group divided them into odd and even numbers.

Over a fifteen minute period, we did a local transport tally, noting the types of vehicles that drove by. After having collected twenty-six special pebbles, we painted one letter of the alphabet on each, and jumbled them around to spell -out words! With

sticks, students wrote words in the sand too. Land Art was fascinating to create, with a whole multitude of natural objects at our fingertips. Imagine a masterpiece, framed with driftwood, a showcase for seaweed, shells and rocks.


Beach YOGA was a highlight of our return to school, with the ripple of waves in the background and melodious birdsong to accompany our zen-like state of being. The scent of wild roses and salty sea-air contributed to the global relaxation process, taking care of our mental health.

As a teacher, I commit to making sure my students can understand and enjoy the gorgeous world around them, afterall, childhood experiences in the Great Outdoors will foster love and concern for Planet Earth and a true sense of belonging. Mother Nature, freedom and freshair will always be part of my planning. For those students whom remained at home, a nature-inclusive classroom will reunite us. 

However, I would like to emphasize one point today. After talking with a new client of the Virtual Fridge this week, I realized that some people who need us are still hesitating. She didn't call me sooner, not because everything was going well, but because she felt other people were worse off than she was. Because she could still manage, with her credit card. Because she hadn't lost everything and was still working a little bit... But the fact is, we're in this mess for a while yet. Things won't get back to the way they were before as quickly as we'd like, and credit cards that can't be paid off at the end of the month are not necessarily the best long-term solution. So what I would like to say to you today is that you don't have to wait until you've lost everything. By then, a simple food basket won't be enough to help you. And don't sacrifice yourself because others might need it more than you do... We have had and continue to have very generous donors!

<u>Reminder:</u> The collection of non-perishable food donations is now done at Épicerie Ratté, which has set up a box near the cash register to help us. Thank you Éric and thank you to all of you who continue to support our mission and our local grocery store!

## Meet Éric Ratté, owner of Épicerie Ratté

A healthy and thriving village needs several basic services, including a grocery store. Located in the heart of the village, Épicerie Ratté has been filling our pantries since 1922. Over the years, the people of Métis have relied on five generations of dedicated grocers who have been proud to serve one of the most beautiful villages in Quebec. It was first a general store operated by Ernest Ratté and then Alphonse (Marie-Anne) and André (Huguette) who turned it into a grocery and butcher shop. Today, Éric Ratté, his wife Lynda and their two children, Olivier and Marie -Pier, are there to welcome you.

In 2014, the grocery store had to close its doors, only to better return with a summer schedule in 2017. It's a friendly, family place where every client feels welcome. Where the joy of working is tangible just by seeing the family and staff's beautiful smiles. The whole place just feels like summertime!

This year, the seasonal reopening came under the grey cloud of the pandemic. Several concerns are looming: customer volume, employee hours, sanitary measures, social distancing and suppliers. Summer residents make

up a large percentage of the clientele and the uncertainty surrounding their arrival puts Épicerie Ratté in a very unpredictable position. 

- Any owner of an animal, in a street or a park, must remove excrement and deposit them in a container or bag.

#### The Green Newsletter - « Time to start using your brown bin again »

With the stay at home order this spring, many people began to cook more and therefore have more kitchen leftovers for the brown bin. During the coming summer, it is important to be well prepared for manage all the little discomforts that could happen.

#### Here are some ideas:

#### In the kitchen:

- Compostable plastic bags are allowed. In your brown bin, they can greatly limit odors and undesirables.
- ♦ Line the bottom of the brown bin and the counter bin with newspaper or use paper bags to collect excess liquids.
- ♦ To avoid the annoyance of worms and flies, wrap your leftover meat or fish in newspaper and put it in the freezer until collection day.

#### Your outdoor bin:

- ♦ Place your brown bin in the shade and close the lid tightly.
- ♦ Take advantage of the increased frequency of collections and put out the bin at each collection, even if it is not full.
- ♦ When empty, rinse your bin with water and mild detergent or white vinegar.
- Sprinkle a little lime or baking soda at the bottom of the bin to facilitate maintenance.
- Problems with worms or flies: spray the worms with salt or baking soda. You can also spray them with white vinegar or sprinkle them with boiling water.
- Place a layer or twists of newspaper between each layer of organic matter.
