






## Digital Photography through the year

## My mom's a firefighter & a first respondent

On a rainy Sunday afternoon, we were driving back to our home when suddenly we saw a minivan that was flipped over on the side of the road near a ditch. A really hard crash. There was some grass and dirt on the road and on the car. By the way I don't really have a clue about how the car ended up here.

Well, because my mother is a firefighter & a first respondent, we stopped on the other side of the road, and even before her beeper rang, she geared up next to our car, gave us (my dad and me) instructions, and crossed the street to help the people stuck in the car. Because it's not my first car crash, I know the drill. Stay in the car & no picture taking



before the victims leave the scene. But it didn't mean that I could not write what I see...

... My mom helped until an ambulance arrived, followed by a firefighter car and a fire truck. They deployed their pipes and their lances, just in case. Then they inspected the car to see the situation. While they were doing that, I heard an electric motor. It was the one in the ambulance, lowering the stretchers, after which they brought it close to the crashed car. Another fire truck arrived. It was a pickup. At the same time, they deployed a number of flares on the road to warn people and they started blocking it. Then they deployed the "jaws of life". First, they installed the orange blanket. Then they installed the hydraulics generator and a bunch of other stuff and connected the hydraulic hose to one of the jaws and, using the jaw on the car, they removed the front right door. They also installed a number of hydraulic "jacks" under the car so that it would not fall over onto the firefighters. Using a jaws of life is not easy, oh no its not; its heavy and it usually takes 2 people to hold it in place. Not long after they put one of the people on a stretcher. At that moment I did not know if there was anybody else in the car. Then a tow truck arrived and I noticed that there was also a police car that I had not seen arrive. So then, they put the first person in the ambulance via the stretcher. While I



was watching, I saw another ambulance arrive. They took another person out of the car, on a stretcher. This person was brought to the other ambulance. Not long after that the first ambulance left with the person who must have been badly injured because the ambulance was using its siren and lights. Then the firefighters started to pack up their stuff. While this was going on, the other ambulance drove away but without using its siren, so that probably meant that the person was not too badly injured. Then the pickup was moved somewhere else so that the tow truck could get the van out. After we left, the tow truck probably towed the wreckage of this minivan.

It was my fourth car crash on the 132 between Mont-Joli and Metis-sur-Mer. And those are just the car crashes I saw with my mother! You can imagine the number of accidents that happen on that part of the 132 each year.

So thanks mom! And thank you to all of you, firefighters and first respondents. Mom, each time you leave the house in a hurry, I freak out. But when I saw the way you and your friends work, it helped me accept that it's important. And one day, if it happens to me, I know you will be there!

A big THANK YOU to Diane Dubois for the donation of her beautiful weaving representing the lighthouse well established on its point. The work is now hanging in the Heritage offices (130 Principale) and accessible to all.

#### DUMP FOR BRANCHES AND DEAD LEAVES

Opening as soon as the ground is OK.

#### Notice to entrepreneurs and landscapers:

If you work on property outside the municipality of Métis-sur-Mer, you must not dispose of waste branches, dead leaves, etc. in the Métis-sur-Mer dump. This dump is reserved strictly for the residents of Métis-sur-Mer.

The dump for branches, dead leaves and earth is located just across from 249, chemin de la Station (fire station). Please follow the signs along the road to ensure you reach the designated area.

It is prohibited to dump garbage bags or construction wood.

## « Multiplatform : One and a half year later »

Hello,

On March 12, 2020, the MRCs of La Matapédia and La Mitis announced a Multiplatform waste management project located in Saint-Moïse that included a composting platform, a technical land-fill site and an ecocenter. The goal was to reduce our high waste management costs and in the end have compost to return to the citizens. At the time of the announcement, a website was put online to present and follow the project (ecoregie.ca/multiplateforme). So, where are we 1.5 years later?

The Environmental Impact Assessment, which began on September 30, 2020, will be submitted to the Ministry of the Environment and the Fight against Climate Change this fall. This study allows us to know the characteristics of the future site, the potential impacts of the project in its environment, according to various aspects (fauna, flora, waterways, wetlands, hydrogeology, archaeology, greenhouse gases, noise impacts, traffic, etc.), and then to find mitigation measures for these potential impacts. The study and the exchanges with the Ministry will all be publicly accessible on the Ministry's Environmental Assessment Registry

(www.ree.environnement.gouv.qc.ca).

As part of this assessment, we held a public consultation on August 23 at the Saint-Moïse Municipal Center. About twenty people attended to learn more about the project, to make comments and suggestions and to ask questions that will be answered in the assessment. The minutes of this meeting are available on the web page mentioned in the introduction.

Following the filing and approval of the assessment by the Ministry, the next steps that will take place this winter are the hearings of the Bureau des Audiences Publiques sur l'Environnement (BAPE). At that time, interested parties will then have the opportunity to express their views on the project to an independent commissioner, whose mandate will be to make recommendations to the Minister of the Environment as to whether or not the project should be approved and if so, under what conditions.

Thereafter, 2022 and 2023 will be used for the various stages of construction (permits, plans and specifications, construction, etc.) with a view to putting the project into operation by January 1st, 2024.
